Guatemala VIM Trip

It's a long way from Portland to Guatemala. It isn't just the physical distance--about 3,000 miles or 7+ hours in the air--it's the distance between people and cultures--the distance between those of us who "have it all" (or wish we did) and those who measure happiness in ways that don't require a calculator or computer.

I was privileged to make my third trip to Guatemala as a member of a United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM) team this past November-December. The trip included a healthy dose of physical work and on-site visits to various mission projects similar to those that I had experienced on two previous journeys to the "land of eternal spring." I also took advantage of opportunities to learn Spanish in an intensive program, and to tour the famous Mayan ruins at Tikal. Joining me in all of these adventures was fellow FUMC member and Global Missions chair Pat Williams, as well as 11 other UMVIMers from various parts of Oregon and Idaho. We were led by veteran Guatemala "guru," Larry Monk.

The seven of us who opted to start our Guatemala sojourn with a week of language school left Portland early in the morning of November 15, arriving in Guatemala City (after a layover in Dallas) that same night. After an overnight stay at a seminary close to the airport, we departed for Quetzaltenango (Xela), a 4-hour drive west. Upon arrival in Xela, we were each assigned to the local families who would host us for our week of school. My family consisted of Hector and Carmen and their daughters, Ceci (12) and Maria (4). Each family is instructed to speak to "their" student only in Spanish,

which was a real struggle for a beginner like me. At the school, we had 5 hours of formal instruction every day, one-on-one with a teacher who also would not speak to us in English! I won't say that I got proficient in

espanol in the space of a week, but I did gain a better understanding of what people around me were saying--and I was also more comfortable using my limited vocabulary for basic communication!

In addition to the intensive instruction, the school offered speakers on various aspects of Guatemalan culture and political life, as well as "field trips" to places of local interest, including a wonderful painted church in a nearby mountain village and a natural hot springs, where we spent a pleasant afternoon bathing. These destinations were reached by a combination of local "chicken" busses and "Guatemalan taxis"--pickup trucks that would take paying passengers to ride standing up in the back!

At the end of the week of school, we returned to Guatemala City to meet the remaining members of our UMVIM team, and begin the working part of the trip. After a brief visit to the old colonial capital of Antigua, and a stop at the Mayan ruins of Iximche (which we were told compared to the ruins we would later see at Tikal as Oregon City compares to Paris!) we headed for the Highlands and the Methodist camp at Lemoa.

Unlike previous UMVIM trips, where we had spent the working part of the trip in a motel in Chichicastenango ("Chichi"), commuting to the worksite at Lemoa, on this trip we spent the first two nights at the camp, sleeping in the bunk beds that were built and painted by previous UMVIM teams, and eating our meals in the camp dining room. We enjoyed the fellowship and camp-like atmosphere of this experience, but we were also happy to transfer to the slightly more comfortable beds in the Chichi motel and the "big city" life of this popular market town for the remainder of our stay in the area.

Our work project at the camp was to continue work on an ongoing project to provide water to the camp by laying about 1,000 feet of PVC pipe in a trench (which, we were glad to see, had already been dug!), gluing the joints, and then recovering the trench. Working at an elevation of almost 8,000 feet, this task was more difficult than we'd thought, and, when later given a choice of continuing to move dirt or painting inside the dormitory building, I opted for the latter, while Pat persevered with her shovel!

In the afternoons, we visited various projects including Salud y Paz, the medical clinic

that many at FUMC learned more about from JoAnn Dwyer in November, and subsequently supported through Alternative Christmas donations. We also visited the Ruth and Nohemi weaving cooperative at Chontola, as well as the Ruth and Nohemi shop in Chichi. We took the children from Hogar de Ninos, the Methodist-sponsored orphanage, on an outing to the Mayan ruins at Utatlan. We also made a special trip to a medical clinic in Padalup, a mountainous area that, although located only about 10 miles from Chichi, took us almost an hour (on a dry, clear day!) to reach. This clinic exists because of the inspired work of Juan Ixtan, a local farmer whose dream is to provide accessible medical care for everyone in the area he serves. One of the many unpaid preachers in Guatemala, Juan cares for his congregation in every sense of the word, and has even donated the land on which is rising a church/clinic building.

We are now “Connected in Mission” (CM) with the Lake Oswego United Methodist Church. A covenanting ritual on January 5th sealed the relationship. Our Lay Leader, Paul Nickell, represented FUMC at their three worship services. Eric and Diane Carlson, Administrative Board Chair at LOUMC, participated at First. The union was symbolized by sharing bread for communion.

But what is it all about? Let me respond to some frequently asked questions:

Q: What is “Connecting Missions?”

A: It is a strategy adopted by the Annual Conference. Its goal is to strengthen local congregations by encouraging them to work in partnerships. The Central District was the first to be “connected.” All United Methodist churches in Oregon and southern Idaho are to be “connected” by 2005.

Q: Why are we linked with another larger, multi-staff church?

A: CM seeks to encourage mutually affirming relationships that can enable effective ministry in new ways. Congregations have been linked because they are similar in size or dynamics, share common opportunities for mission, or face common challenges. For example, the three Korean-language UM ministries in our area are “connected,” congregations in southeast Portland are partnered to address needs in their overlapping neighborhoods. We hope that LOUMC and FUMC can partner to more effectively serve our region.

Q: Who made the decision about our “connection?”

A: Our District Superintendent invited dialogue about the concept of “Connecting Missions” over a year and a half ago. It was discussed at several Leadership Council meetings and at the 2002 Fall Church Conference. A district-wide Congregational Development Team--including clergy and laity--helped identify and facilitate linkages. Your pastors and the Lake Oswego UMC pastors were invited to a meeting with the Team, hosted by our DS, at which existing “connections” were discussed. All agreed that linking our congregations was the most reasonable option.

Q: Does this mean we are restricted only to work with Lake Oswego UMC?

A: No! We are still free to work with other UM congregations, in ecumenical organizations as well as community service networks. We will continue to respond to opportunities for service and outreach wherever God calls us--but we would want to explore whether our covenant partnership could increase our effectiveness in those activities.

Q: Isn’t “Connecting Mission” really a way to expand our community outreach and global missions?

A: Yes--but it is more than that. CM is about partnering to strengthen all the ministries of our church. For example, we already have plans for joint leadership training. We might share in educational experiences, youth activities, combined music ministries or discover more efficient administrative procedures. CM is a covenant involving our total congregational life--not just social witness or global outreach.

Q: “Connecting Mission” seems vague. What are we committed to do?

A: CM is not a program with specific activities and defined expectations. It is about relationships between congregations and a process for developing mutual ministries. What it will mean for us will emerge as we share ideas and as our leaders--lay and clergy--meet to vision and plan. The pastors have discussed our linkage several times already. We will continue to advocate and encourage the partnership, but how it develops (and how effective it is) will be up to your elected leaders and, ultimately each of us.


Library Looking For Volunteers

Winter Wonderland

I want to extend a special thanks to everyone who participated in our Advent and Christmas services. The Chancel Choir and First Church Quartet, Veritas, Sound Seekers, Cherub Choir, Genesis ringers, JubELLation, Sanctuary Bells and their directors made each service a very special event for all of us. Also thanks to Colleen Foster for providing organ music for the last service of 2003. It was a family affair since her husband, the Rev. Tom Foster, was our guest pastor that Sunday.

Following this past week's display of nature's winter surprises, it's time to put FUMC's winter schedule into full swing. While our children's and youth choirs managed to meet for the past two weeks, this Sunday they should be functioning back at 100%. Veritas begins at 9:15am followed by the Sound Seekers and Cherub Choir beginning at 9:30am.

The Chancel Choir will resume 7:30pm Thursday rehearsals and refresher get-togethers at 9:40am on Sunday mornings. They will begin to rehearse our collaboration work with the Columbia Symphony Orchestra for the March 20 concert in addition to our regular Sunday service demands.

The Genesis Ringers and JuBELLation begin their rehearsal this Wednesday and the Sanctuary Bell Choir has its first rehearsal on Thursday at 6:00pm.

We welcome Nancy Nordwall returning to our music staff as the Sound Seekers director.

Please remember that all of our musical groups are open to everyone and we encourage you to give us a try.

Beckham Court is the building-enclosed courtyard one looks into from the Narthex or from the western window of the Sanctuary. It has the outdoor cross and the thirty-ton boulder/cornerstone in it on a concrete platform. It is named for Horace F. Beckham (and his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Beckham, who had been pioneer Methodist leaders in the south west). Horace was the Vice-Chair of the Building Committee when it was established in 1954, and soon became the Chair. He was, perhaps, the most influential single person in the construction in 1956-57 of the original units (the Sanctuary and the 100 and 200 buildings). For example, the architect wanted wooden shakes for the roof of the building; Horace wanted slate. And slate was what was put on. Horace insisted that the buildings be all on one floor, to avoid steps or elevators. And so on. Horace enlisted the assistance of the politically astute and influential attorney Herbert Hardy, to persuade the State Highway Commission to change its design for the freeway built to replace Canyon Road. That freeway (Highway 26), as you know, incorporates a tunnel, and the original design for the tunnel called for it to be perfectly straight. That would have brought the eastern (downtown) side of the freeway directly through the property only recently acquired for the new Church. The Church had spent 6 long years finding a close-to-downtown suitable site, and Horace was not one to give up easily. The tunnel was redesigned with the curve in it which it has now--a curve which experience proved to be notoriously unsafe, requiring the drastic speed reductions and no-lane change regulations it now has. Every time I drive through it, I think of Horace! To help you remember him too, there is a plaque in the Court, but it is mounted barely above the ground and is largely hidden now by the seat benches in the Narthex. This is what it says: "Beckham Court. In memory of Horace Beckham chairman of the building committee when the cornerstone was laid. Wise counselor, indefatigable worker in the construction of the building around you." Horace's daughter, Mrs. Norman "Becky" Zeller is still a member and regular attendant.
