Their letter arrived on the eve of what promised -- and proved -- to be a contentious General Conference. The Council of Bishops does not write often. This time it was calling the delegates, and all United Methodists, to remember our heritage and embrace our values. It's a call that bears repeating as our congregation confronts difficult issues that test our unity.

Disagreement is nothing new among Christians. The Acts of the Apostles and the letters of Paul are rife with vigorous debate and dispute. The early church gathered councils to formulate creeds clarifying core doctrine. Their efforts did not quell the controversies.

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, was a man of deep faith and firm beliefs. But he realized that others of integrity and deep faith had different ideas. While he embraced classical Christian ideas, he understood that unity and common mission arises not so much out of doctrinal agreement-but out of a vital encounter with risen Christ. Halford E. Luccock and Paul Hutchinson, in their classic work, *The Story of Methodism*, note that Wesley avoided doctrinal tests for those seeking Methodist membership; rather he asked, "Is thy heart as my heart? Then give me thy hand!" (Abingdon Press, 1963 p. 190)

With Wesley, our Bishops urged us to realize Christ's spirit is in our midst:

"On some issues, including human sexuality, we are not of one opinion. At the same time, we are united in our commitment to Jesus Christ. We are united in our commitment to uphold the *Book of Discipline*. We are united in our conviction that the critical issues will not be ultimately resolved with legislation. We find the answers in Christ-like love, expressed in dialogue, mutual respect and a humble search for the mind of God." (Bishops' Letter to General Conference, issued April 26, 2004 by the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church in Pittsburgh, PA)

Their reminder did not fall on deaf ears. General Conference was marked by sharp differences of opinion and sometimes rancorous sparring on the sidelines. Clearly United Methodists hold differing opinion on some issues of doctrine, Biblical authority and human sexuality. But the delegates, moved by the Spirit, affirmed their desire to join hands in mission and continue to seek God's will. On the last day they resolved:

As United Methodists

We remain in covenant with one another,
Even in the midst of disagreement,
And reaffirm our commitment to work together
For our common mission
Of making disciples of Jesus Christ
Throughout the world

(Resolution on Church Unity, adopted by the 2004 General Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting in session May 7, 2004.)

The Bishops were speaking to us, too. We are not all of one mind either on matters of faith or the issues of our day. Unity does not mean we always agree. It means we realize that, in Christ, we have more in common than we have in difference. It means that we commit ourselves to remain together, to care for one another, and to work together in "...Christ-like love, expressed in dialogue, mutual respect and a humble search for the mind of God."

who are we?

Cal Brockman, Sr., a member of our congregation, is an "old pro" in the furniture business. He recently gave to us a newspaper clipping about the "anatomy of the Eames" lounge chairs currently used in the SE "reading corner" of the library. We have four of them and they were originally bought, on the architect's recommendation, for the Fireside Room. According to the clipping, they are now regarded as "collectable classic" because they "embody the American modernist movement." They are made of three interlocking sections of molded plywood, upholstered in black leather and fixed to a welded steel swivel frame. They are in the library because they never really quite "belonged" in the Fireside Room (partly because we have made that room into more of a multiple use room than the "parlor" was originally designed to be). That room was originally designed at the request of the premier women's group, then the Women's Society of Christian Service (now the United Methodist Women), for their use and more "refined" uses such as wedding and memorial service receptions, piano recitals, etc. -- usages that one would associate with one's living room (as opposed to one's family room, for example). These chairs, one woman complained at the start, "made it look like a men's club." At least one prior pastor used a couple of them in his office. But they seem now to have found a proper place.

They bring to mind some other Herman Miller Co. chairs we have -- the white, molded fiberglass chairs used in 202. These were bought in 1957 and have withstood the rigors of church usage (churches are pretty hard on tables and chairs; some of the former bought in 1985 didn't last ten years) very well. They embodied a unique set of unconventional legs, a spidery framework of welded steel, little larger than wire, which proved to be very durable and also provides a very stable chair (one can stand on one, for example, as people do to reach high shelves, etc). The design has only one flaw -- it can't be stacked or folded, so they take a lot of room to store when not in use. By 1967, when Collins Fellowship Hall was built, the design had been modified to make them stackable, and we have them there also. They were not the least expensive chairs available, but they have more than repaid their cost by their durability.

raising the roof

TRUSTEES BEGIN REROOFING PROJECT

The Trustees have entered into a contract to replace the roof of the classroom wing containing rooms numbered 100 excluding the offices, narthexes, chapel, sanctuary or north addition.

The existing slate roof was installed in 1956/57 at original construction. It is nearing 50 years of age. There is an active leak. The new materials will be similar to those at the chapel, library and north addition. Work is expected to start the week of May 17, 2004 and be completed about June 11, 2004.

The contractor is CC&L Roofing, a local company with broad experience. They have worked for this church in the past. They will use six to nine of our parking spaces for on site storage of supplies and equipment. These spaces will be fenced off for the safety of people and equipment. They will not be available for our use. Old materials will be removed from the site daily by dump truck. We will see additional truck traffic during weekday work hours.

The Trustees have established a major maintenance "sinking fund" to pay for large projects such as this.
