**WHAT IS GOD ASKING YOU TO GIVE ?**

Giving is indispensable to Christian discipleship. We express our priorities, values, and love by our giving. Giving also connects people with mission. The prevalent belief for many years has been that as church members mature in their faith, they will somehow begin to understand and value giving as an expression of that faith. However, the evidence does not validate this view. A more accurate view is that giving is a part of the process that helps people mature in their expression of faith.

The focus of our conversations about giving should be on a person's need to give as a part of personal spiritual growth and discipleship, rather than on the reality of affluence or poverty. Too often we want those church members who have a large measure of financial wealth to be the financial leaders, but the issue ought to focus on their spiritual maturity expressed by their giving. When churches identify those who express the gift of giving in their community of faith, it is common to find people of modest resources included in the top levels of giving.

Understanding of financial stewardship must begin with the Bible. God is the source, and giving is rooted in God. The recognition that God created and owns everything is the appropriate starting point for understanding stewardship. John Wesley said it clearly in his Sermon #50: "God entrusted you for a season with goods of various kinds but the sole property of these still rests in God, nor can ever be alienated from him." And the Bible offers one standard of measurement in our response to God's generosity: the tithe.

We live in an age where the phrase fair share is valued as politically correct, but the Bible offers the tithe. Some churches have used assessments that are related to a host of variables to establish expectations, but the Bible offers the tithe. Some churches rely on user fees to pay for some ministries, but the Bible offers the tithe. While many of us have not reached a tithe, all of us should have the tithe as our goal.

We look forward to the spiritual growth we can experience together on our journey to Consecration Sunday, October 10, as we more fully realize that our giving is an expression of gratitude and love for God.

# memo

I have never met Peter and Barbara MacGregor, but the couple, from New York, sent a personal letter to me, filled with scriptural pronouncements, praying for God to intervene in November's election, and warning that if their candidate is not elected it will "usher in an era of hostility to people of faith." Days later came a letter from the other party suggesting election of their opponent would assure the erosion of civil freedoms and suppression of diversity.

The public discourse is never at it's most sensible in the weeks leading up to a presidential election. But this year seems filled with more invective and innuendo than any I can remember. Much of it is directed at the religious community. I suppose the sublime moved to the ridiculous this week when West Virginians were greeted with the absurd claim that the agenda of the other side is to "ban the Bible." It was quickly denounced.

Such tactics—employed to some degree by both parties—do nothing to enrich the political debate. Indeed, they only serve to stir fear and spark emotional reaction. They have no place in the very serious matter of selecting the best person to lead our country in perilous times. They underscore the need for voters of careful reason, deep faith and strong values who can see past such shams to the deeper issues at contest.

Sojourner's, the ministry striving to integrate spiritual renewal and social justice, (see <http://www.sojo.net>) has launched an ad campaign under the banner, "God is Not a Republican Or a Democrat." They believe the Christians can vote for either major candidate for reasons deeply rooted in their faith, and they offer some helpful suggestions for discerning how to vote:

"We believe that all candidates should be examined by measuring their policies against the complete range of Christian ethics and values.

We will measure the candidates by whether they enhance human life, human dignity, and human rights; whether they strengthen family life and protect children; whether they promote racial reconciliation and support gender equality; whether they serve peace and social justice; and whether they advance the common good rather than only individual, national and special interests." My earliest memory of a presidential election was one of the contests between Dwight Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson. My father looked so much like Eisenhower that people would stop him on the street and interrupt our meals in restaurants to meet him. Eventually dad became so tired denying it to unbelieving fans that he simply stole one of Eisenhower's quips, "I only ask you to weigh the issues carefully and vote accordingly."

It's still good advice.

## scholarships a report

Bob Anderson received funding from the Memorial Scholarship Committee to attend the Stephen Ministry Leadership Training Conference in Ontario, CA, in July. Bob will now be working as a leader, along with Joan Jozwiak, of the First UMC Stephen Ministry team. He commented on the "extreme challenge" of following Iola Halligan, who held this role for many years.

In his report Bob wrote that the training was intense but generated "an amazing amount of energy and enthusiasm" among the 354 people attending. The training covered "every conceivable situation between caregiver and care receiver." Bob emphasized the need for a church our size to increase funding for the ongoing education of the Stephen Ministers and Leaders in order "to maintain and improve the effectiveness, depth, professionalism and care-giving motivation" of the team.

The Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in 1949 to help United Methodists who are preparing for Christian service and to educate members and staff of this congregation to extend the ministry of the church.
