**LIFE IS A LEAP OF FAITH** by Art Kayser

Each of us is separate, unique, complex, and individual. We walk our paths, often with arms linked to others, but they are *our* paths, even when they are not necessarily of our choosing. Sometimes to follow a path we must take a "Leap of Faith": that the job will pan out; that the relationship will last; that the money will cover the cost; that there will be enough time. Life teaches us many lessons through the schools of joy and hard knocks, difficulty and happiness, thrift and plenty.

At sixty-plus years I have experienced much: joyous births of children and then grandchildren; deaths of parents, relatives, friends; times of relative peace and world-wide war; wonderful friendships and alienation from friends; jobs with horrendous schedules requiring enormous commitment; frugal times and times of plenty.

And what have I learned through my experience? "I don't have to go through this (Life!) alone." God's spiritual presence is my constant companion. And truly, even when my path is difficult and steep, my cup is full and overflowing.

What does my life experience have to do with financial stewardship? Everything! How can I not return a portion of my blessings to the God who has been so generous, the God who has given His Son Jesus to show us the ways to *real* life. I *want* to be a good steward. When I take a portion out of my cup and give it for God's use, my cup still overflows. It's a miracle!

How is *your* cup doing these days? I hope your cup is full and God's blessings on you are many. There is a deep spiritual dimension in the act of giving money to help God's church reach out as *his hands* into our community and our world. If you follow the news you know that the world needs God's hands to be active and energetic and helping in so many places and ways. And money does, in fact, help the world go round.

There is also a deep connection between faith and money that has everything to do with who we serve, what we believe, and how we act on our beliefs. On Consecration Sunday each of us asks: "What is God calling me to give?" Consider your blessings, God's generosity. Can you step up in your giving next year? Jesus said: "Where your money is, there your heart will be also."

Take a Leap of Faith that will help lead to life that is *really* life. Let's join our arms, and walk the path of generosity and faith — joyously, separately, and all together.



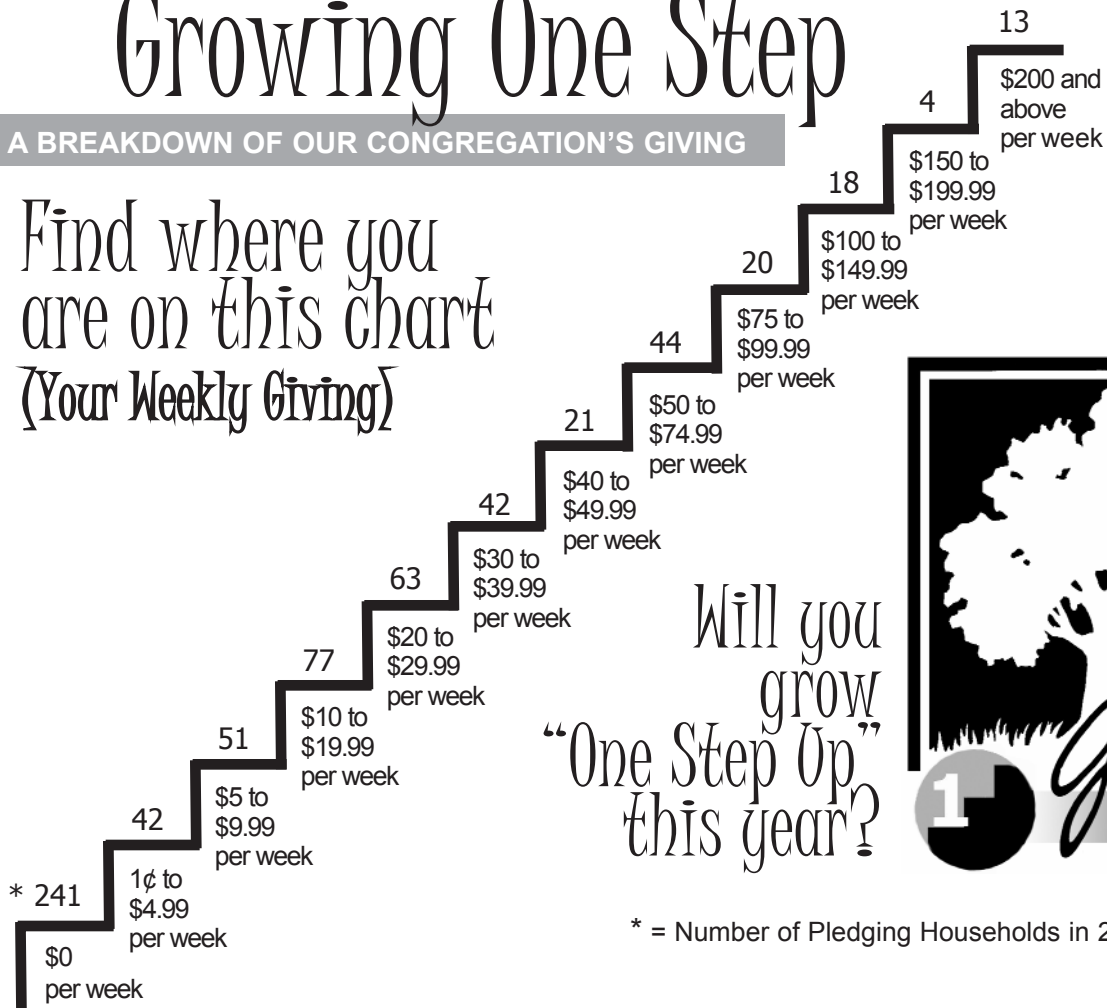

# BALLOT MEASURE 36

## LEADERSHIP COUNCIL TAKES ACTION FOLLOWING DISCERNMENT

Beginning last spring and continuing through the past month, First UMC has sponsored forums on the topic of same-sex marriage, with the aim of engaging our congregation in dialogue (or as John Wesley might put it, "holy conferencing") on a timely issue that also commands our attention in November's election.

Last spring, a general session on the same-sex marriage garnered a large attendance. Just a few weeks ago we revisited the issue with a more specific presentation about the pros and cons of Ballot Measure 36 (which qualified for November's ballot after our spring forum). Then on September 19 members of First UMC gathered for a time of prayer and spiritual reflection, engaging in the discipline of spiritual discernment to ask the question: "What is God's will for our congregation on this topic?"

Reflecting on these events and the outcomes of the discernment process, the Leadership Council at its September 22 meeting approved this resolution:

*We are United Methodists who believe that our Christian faith demands social justice and equality. We confess that as a body we are not of one mind on the right to marry or the definition of marriage, and we seek to discern God's will for us and our human relationships. However, we oppose any state or federal constitutional amendments or laws that would deny equal protections, equal rights, the enumerated privileges or immunities guaranteed by the constitution to citizens regardless of race, creed, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. Therefore, we recommend a No vote on Ballot Measure 36, which seeks to amend the Oregon Constitution by defining legal marriage as being only between a man and a woman.*

This resolution was considered and voted upon after considerable dialogue and prayer. Key to the Leadership Council's action was, first, an acknowledgment of First UMC's historic and longstanding support of civil rights. And at the same time, the Leadership Council also recognized that this question engenders other opinions, varying and also valid. Reconciling these two points of views resulted in the language you read above.

Briefly, here's how to understand the Leadership Council's action on behalf of our congregation: We endorse equal civil rights for everyone. We are not yet of one mind on the question of same-sex marriage. We turn to God to discern God's will for us. In the meantime, we reject the human measures that would interfere with our discernment. We earnestly seek to continue our prayer and study.

Such a result likely will not surprise most United Methodists. After all, John Wesley pretty much suggested as much: On essential matters of Christian belief, he preached, Methodists are united; but on non-essential matters, he added, Methodists "think, and let think." And, he said, they pray.

Even today, as we attend to current issues and headlines, our heritage of relying on Scripture, tradition, reason and experience continues to be relevant, it thrives, and it indwells still in our every act.

Hear what Spirit is saying to the Church: Thanks be to God. Amen!

# who are we ?

Our pastor recently quoted a group which uses as one of the standards for measuring political candidates by “measuring their policies against ... a range of Christian ethics and values” including, among several other things, “gender equality.” That, to our shame, is a johnny-come-lately to Methodists. Although John Wesley himself commissioned women as Lay Preachers, the chief bodies of American Methodism did not permit their ordination until 1956, and the first woman ordained in Oregon-Idaho was in 1960. In this church, women had to maneuver to have any official participation at all. That was part of the Women's Rights Movement of the last half of the 19th century, and the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary societies were one of their means. They were organized by women and for women, often against the advice/wishes/power of male pastors. In Oregon, the Women's Foreign Missionary Society in 1867 raised \$11.50 from seven churches and offered it to the Annual Conference, so it had to be given to a male pastor to present the women's gift to the missionary cause! Women could not participate by membership or voting in local church administrative bodies until 1912. More than half of the membership were women, but the 1954 Building Committee which planned the first unit of our present building had only one woman. In 1960, or so, when the Trustees were trying to pay off the indebtedness on the building the women had \$10,000 which they had raised for a new kitchen and a “parlor” (neither of which had been included in the original construction). They were asked to give it for the retirement of the indebtedness. They did so on two conditions: 1.) the next unit of construction had to include a full kitchen and a parlor (which were met by the present kitchen serving Collins Hall and the Fireside Room); and 2.) there had to be a woman on the new building committee. The struggle for inclusive language (not always referring to God as a male - “Father,” “he,” etc) is even more recent and not yet fully won. The 1988 Methodist Hymnal, which we use, made some tentative steps in that direction, but refused to be thorough. Many of the anthems used by our choirs blatantly ignore the problem. Physician, heal thyself!
