# memo

Rev. Dr. Arvin R. Luchs

"Now watch what you say, son!" my mother quickly enjoined her impetuous young boy when she sensed I was about to blurt out something impulsive. Dr. Deborah Tannen would like to say that to the nation --particularly in these pre-election days of partisan polemics.

Tannen is the distinguished professor of linguistics at Georgetown University and the author of numerous books and articles about the social impact of language.

She is particularly concerned with our tendency, nurtured by the media, to approach every problem as if it were a fight between two sides.\*

"We see it in our public conversations, which are always debates, get the most polarized extremes, put them on, let them slug it out. And we see it in an attack culture where journalists, intellectuals of all sorts think unless you're attacking and criticizing, you're not really thinking. It's a general atmosphere of animosity and contention that has taken over our public discourse." (interview with David Gergen, *The News Hour with Jim Lehrer*, March 27, 1998 accessed at [http://www.pbs.org/newshour/gergen/march98/tannen\\_3-27.html](http://www.pbs.org/newshour/gergen/march98/tannen_3-27.html) on Oct 17, 2004)

Significant issues seldom have just two alternatives and in the simplification it becomes impossible for leaders to find compromise and consensus. Not only has the political process been paralyzed, but, in a paper published in August, the professor observed,

"the personal connection between citizens and nation...has broken down, replaced by an adversarial stance of citizens toward their government... Rather than regarding the government as "ours"--a source of services that better citizens' lives--many Americans now see the services the government provides as their due, while regarding the government that provides those services as an enemy force." While Tannen's studies focused on the government, mass media and political discourse, I suspect her analysis can be applied to most organizations-even the church. The fabric of unity that binds United Methodists together has been stretched and tattered by rhetoric that simplifies centuries of rich and textured discussion of the Bible and of faith into either "progressive" or "conservative." Our "General Conference"--the only group that can officially speak for the church --- was rent by polarization and animosity. We seem unable to come together to find a consensus on significant issues of church life and public witness. The sense of ownership and support for ministries beyond the local church is waning.

It doesn't have to be this way. The Doctor offers a prescription for America to move beyond the acrimony:

"Reclaim compromise and conciliation in our own exchanges. Be more careful in choosing the words we use. Put ourselves in the other guy's shoes. Look beyond "the other side" to "another side" or "other sides." Reframe polarizing choices to find a third -- or fourth -- solution. Take the "argument" out of our argument culture. It's not bad medicine for our church. Like my mother said, "Now watch what you say!"

## who are we?

Dr. Raymond E. Balcomb

Talking a week or so ago to a group about the "Architecture and Symbolism" of our building brought to mind again the fact that we have an altar in our sanctuary. I would guess that no Methodist of retirement age ever saw an altar in a Methodist Church in his/her childhood, while many of those under 60 have seen them all their lives. One of the ironies of my own lifetime is that in 1949 I wrote an article which was published in a Methodist magazine for ministers, entitled: *No Altars for Protestants*, and every church I served after that, with one lonely exception, had an altar! My article in 1949 was inspired by the obvious trend of the times in remodeling and new building toward using altars, which was the outcome of evangelical Protestantism's early 20th century being smitten with the godliness of older Christian architecture: either that of Christopher Wren (of which one sees a great deal of in southern churches) or medieval Gothic, which one sees in the First United Methodist Church of Evanston or Riverside in New York City, which were built in the first third of the century. This was accompanied by a revival of interest in more formal worship, use of "liturgical colors," robed ministers, etc. The architect of our present building said that the shape of our altar was patterned after that of primitive Old Testament altars (piles of stones). So far as I know he never explained why he faced it with polished granite! It has never been fully functional -- it is too high and too far from the communion rail to use in that service (and it is outdated by even Roman Catholicism's recognition in the 60s that a *table* should be used for that purpose). It is good for the uses we make of it: flowers and the presentation of the offering. My argument in 1949 was, basically, that altars were invented and used for animal sacrifice, and that is their basic symbolism. And I still contend that therefore they are inappropriate in a Protestant church.
