

Death seems altogether too close today. The joy and eagerness of the children waving palm branches, and tender moments of the baptism of a child, just weeks old, stood in contrast to the courageous grieving of family and friends as we remembered the too brief life of Gary Jorgensen

As I write, the news is filled with stories of the agony of Terry Schiavo's family, exhausted after fifteen years at the bedside of their brain-damaged daughter and wife, torn with emotion and conflict, struggling over the most difficult decisions humans have to make. There are no easy answers or clear moral choices in such a time as this.

I mourn each day as the headlines report still more deaths from wars in Iraq, Afghanistan, the Middle East, and Africa. I am stunned by senseless violence and gruesome murders in Atlanta, Florida, and on our own city streets.

The presence of death will be close to us throughout Holy Week. That, of course, is the time we symbolically trek alongside Jesus and the disciples from the adulation of the crowds on Palm Sunday, to a Passover supper in an Upper Room, prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane, his arrest, trial, floggings and on Friday his crucifixion, death and burial.

As we know, that is not the end. For a Christian, while death is very real, it is never the last word. Within even the most destructive and devastating moments is an energy and a spirit bringing new hope, new possibilities, new life.

And so to a world stunned by misery and loss we proclaim a hope.

To a world held captive to anger and hatred we raise the power of love.

To a world seeped in death and destruction, we declare the power of life.

Come and join with us as we declare our confidence in the power of God—a power that not even death can stop.



considering a new covenant relationship



For 2005, the Global Missions committee is asking consideration of a covenant relationship with Clara Mridula Biswas, a missionary from Bangladesh, who, for the past four years, has been posted to Cambodia.

For many years, First UMC has supported three missionaries through "Covenant Relationships." In exchange for a financial contribution (the amount of which is based upon the membership of the church) to the General Board of Global Ministries, the church enjoys a "partnership" relationship with these missionaries. The missionaries keep in touch with partner churches via photos, newsletters and e-mail and, when they "itinerate," or return to the United States for home leave, they visit their partner churches and speak at whatever events are arranged to honor them, and to help them describe their mission. First UMC has had ongoing relationships with Gordon and Teca Greathouse in Brazil, Teri and Ev Erbele in Latvia and Lithuania, and Ron and Diane Ray in Kenya.

For 2005, the Global Missions committee is asking consideration of a covenant relationship with Clara Mridula Biswas, a missionary from Bangladesh, who, for the past four years, has been posted to Cambodia.

In Cambodia, Clara, a trained social worker, has been working with the Vulnerable Children Assistance Organization to provide scholarships and job training to street children, helping to provide nutritional support and a Sunday School program for children in the Phnom Penh dump, working with the orphans in the Live Children Association, and trying to improve living conditions and opportunities for residents of Phnom Penh's slums.

Global Mission committee member, Dee Poujade, had the honor of meeting Clara on her recent UMVIM trip to Cambodia, and suggested to the committee that Clara's work was worthy of support.

Clara's newsletter will be posted on the bulletin board in Collins Hall along with our other missionaries' most recent newsletters.

who are we

A while back I took a guided tour of underground Portland -- the maze of tunnels, rooms, etc. dug in the 19th century beneath much of what was Portland's "downtown," West Burnside Street. I went in under the present "Hobos" bar and restaurant at 120 NW 3rd. The tunnels ran from the waterfront on the Willamette River to about NW 23rd and had legitimate commercial uses (delivery, storage) for many places of business. They were and are not nearly as impressive as those under Kansas City, but they had a noteriety of their own: they were used in the shanghaiing of sailors. Nobody is sure how the word "shanghai" come to be a verb. The *Oxford English Dictionary* says it is "nautical slang" which "originated in the U.S." What it meant was getting a sailor dead drunk, or drugged, then delivering him, for a price, to a ship that was about to sail; when he woke up he was already at sea and had no alternative but to work his way at least as far as the next port-of-call. It was cheaper to get seamen that way than to keep them on salary while a ship lay over in port (maybe two or three months) waiting for new cargo. It was, to say the least, a demeaning and vicious practice, and Portland was famous for it. One of the persons who led in the fight to outlaw it, was a member of this church for more than forty years: "Father" Fletcher. He himself had been shanghaiied; he also had lived the rugged life of a "49er" gold miner in both California and Idaho. Born an Irish Catholic, he had become a Methodist in the gold fields, taught himself to read by studying the Bible, and drifted to Portland for no particular reason. For a long time he was the janitor in our second building, the "Taylor St. Church." But he was also a Class Leader (sort of an unpaid assistant pastor) and a spiritual giant. He established the first mission (sort of a YMCA) for seamen in Portland, and he mobilized the decent citizenry to end the malignant, although profitable practice. He died almost one hundred years ago and was the first to leave what, in effect, became a permanent endowment for this congregation.


