A spiritual giant, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, in the last interview before his death reflected: "God created a reminder, an image. Humanity is a reminder of God. As God is compassionate, let humanity be compassionate." *

In a world in which most of us are treated as data points and our individual humanity yields to mass marketing, we are in desperate need of people who care. Many of us turn to the church to find a warm heart, an open ear, and a compassionate response.

Our congregation has earned high marks for giving care. Under Rev. Sene's capable guidance the ill and hospitalized in our midst receive regular contact and she oversees a network of volunteers. We are grateful to a number of retired clergy who help with visitation. Our Stephen Ministers are assigned to meet with those in particular need of support. Janet Richards has enlisted a team of people who take communion to the homebound on the first Sunday of each month. Our United Methodist Women maintain a prayer chain and their Circles keep in touch with homebound members. Mary Jane Hendrickson, Jane Rhodes the Rev. Ben Owre and others provide a monthly Healing Service as well as a regular prayer calendar.

As your church staff and the personnel committee pondered the impending changes in staffing, it is not surprising that 'pastoral care' was assigned a top priority. I was delighted when the Staff-Parish Relations Committee enlisted the Rev. Tom Foster to be our part-time Minister of Pastoral Care, starting in July.

Tom is, of course, no stranger to First Church. After forty years of effective service as a pastor of congregations in Oregon and Idaho, he retired and settled in our congregation. For the last nine years he has participated in our worship life, lent his musical skills to our choir, been a church officer, taught classes and helped lead the Senior Travel Program. And, along the way, he has given generously of his time and energy to support the pastors in visitation and worship leadership.

Rev. Foster will have an office in our church building and be part of our pastoral and program teams—but a good share of his time will be spent visiting in hospitals and care facilities. He will also be the staff contact for the Stephen Ministries and other care giving teams at First UMC.

I am delighted that Rev. Foster has agreed to serve on our team. In the years we have known each other, I've developed a deep respect and appreciation for both his energy and pastoral talents and his dedication to service in Christ's name. I look forward to welcoming him to the team!

CHANGING CHRISTIANITY



schools in Liberia

Who Are We ?

There is considerable discussion currently about "faith" as a qualification for public office, and some are charging others with discriminating against persons of faith. Let me tell you a tale of two bankers, both Vice-Presidents of U.S. National Bank (then a locally owned bank), both men of faith and members of this congregation. One of them was responsible for a bequest left to us in 1908 in the amount of \$3,600. Half of its income was to be sent to our national Board of Missions, and half used by this church for local purposes. In a sense it was the true start of our Permanent Endowment Fund, but this banker, who ran one of the larger branches, was so cautious in his stewardship that he invested the money in a bank Certificate of Deposit (as had his predecessors), so that when we had had the money for sixty years it was still worth \$3,600. On the other banker's advice, (he ran the bank's Trust Department) the Trustees invested a \$10,000 gift. Within a year it was lost totally, and he resigned, a failure in his own eyes, as our advisor. One hardly knows what moral to draw from these two, but one of them surely is that "faith" alone is not a sufficient guide to choose leaders of any type. Another, more surprising moral, is that not even the first one would have won Jesus' commendation. He told a story one time (Matthew 25:14-30), about some slaves given responsibility over substantial amounts of money by their owner. One of them hid his share in a safe place and eventually returned it intact, but he was not commended by his master. The other two risked their amounts, and increased them, and eventually were commended. (Jesus doesn't say anything about the possibility of losing by investing!) The analogy is not perfect, but at least this lesson is: Jesus expects us to take some risks in this life. Playing it safe is not always what we should do. Actually, this tale of two bankers tells us the best we can do is be responsible; faith helps us to do that, but is not in itself a guarantor of good results.

The ants go marching one by one - so will First Church on June 19, 2005 when we join the celebration of NW Gay Pride Parade. This will be the sixth year First Church has participated and we invite all in the congregation to join us for this wonderful day of celebration and diversity. There will be a car available for those who cannot walk the parade route. This year's theme is "Everyday People." We look forward to seeing everyone there. The line up for the Gay Pride Parade, Sunday, June 19, begins at 11:15 AM at SW 15th and Glisan. You can also consider joining us after church. The parade generally does not begin moving until about noon. Waterfront Park will hold a variety of activities beginning on Friday and ending on Sunday afternoon with a commemoration for Fathers Day.
