One of Brenda's major missions is to guide visitors in the journey to membership by welcoming them warmly, inviting them to explore the history and values of First Church, and then incorporating them into its spiritual and social life.

Whenever and wherever there is a cry for help, Brenda listens and responds. Quite often a hospital visit or a comforting encounter occurs at an inconvenient time but she can be counted on to respond. She seems to know when a prayer is needed along with a comforting ear or astute advice. She continues to actively support acceptance and assistance of persons experiencing emotional difficulties.

Brenda is passionate about the church's commitment to reconciliation and is instrumental in nourishing and strengthening the Reconciling Fellowship. Joining her as members and friends march in the First Church contingent of the Gay Pride Parade on Sunday, June 19, would be a wonderful tribute to her contribution in this area.

Brenda's sermons are particularly noteworthy because of her ability to link scripture to life experiences. In addition, many of us, children as well as adults, have been touched by her Children's Time messages, offered with occasional help from husband Daniel.

My family's last Sunday at First Church, June 26, is quickly approaching. We have been dreading this Sunday. Even though we are excited about a new adventure in Idaho, with new friends to make, and new people to work beside, it is difficult to say good-bye to the church and friends whom we have grown to love in seven years. This church has truly become our family's faith home. Cameron was born during our first year at the church. Jared got over his separation

anxiety in the church nursery by watching and talking to the Max trains. This congregation supported our whole family during Sean's two years on the ketogenic diet. Sarah made her first public appearance on the organ in our sanctuary during a Youth Sunday. She impressed even Jonas when she sat down and played her piece perfectly without any music in front of her. After the service we discovered that she hadn't planned it that way; she had actually lost her music.

I arrived at First Church after three years away from ministry. I had spent those years questioning my call to ministry after a divorce and remarriage. When I returned to ministry by serving this congregation, I did not know if I would be staying in the ordained ministry, but First Church is a healing congregation. The reconciling ministries of this congregation extend beyond the boundaries of lay and ordained. I quickly fell in love with this congregation and with serving God again through service in the church. Over the last seven years I feel that my call to ministry has again been confirmed and strengthened. I thank you for your grace and love as we have worked together in the church and community.

I have been fortunate to work with two senior pastors whom I admire and respect. I have appreciated Ross' sense of humor and his gentle witness to God's inclusive love. I have enjoyed Arvin's quirky humor and his sometimes extreme devotion to the church. I have been amazed every time it has snowed and he has rented a room at the Mallory so that he would be close to the church. First Church is fortunate to have so many supportive retired pastors to add to the leadership of the appointed clergy. I know that I have benefited greatly from their wisdom and sometimes gentle criticism. I look forward to their continued mentoring in the years ahead.

One of the greatest gifts this congregation has to offer the Portland community is its strong message of God's unconditional love and acceptance. It has been uplifting to hear new church members say that they have chosen to attend First Church because they want to raise their children with the value of inclusiveness. I have been humbled in these years by the courage and faithfulness of the people in our congregation who have been asked to leave other churches, who have faced possible rejection from their families, who have even encountered occasional unfortunate looks or comments from unthinking people in our own congregation, and who have still remained strong in their love for God and for the church. The most spiritual moments for me in the last seven years have been Communion Sundays as I have watched all of you come forward to receive the body and blood of Christ. I always think of your stories, and I say a prayer for each of you.

It helps to leave knowing that Lowell Greathouse and Tom Foster will be serving beside you in this congregation. I have been blessed to be part of the long line of servants in this church. Thank you. And may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all, evermore. Amen.


Tuesday, July 19, 2005

The Staff-Parish Relations Committee is pleased to announce the appointment of Paul L. Adams as the new Director of Youth Ministries at First UMC. Paul assumed responsibilities on June 1.

In announcing the appointment, SPRC Chair, Dr. Wid Bleything, noted that Paul comes to this position with deep roots in the Methodist Church. It starts with his great grandfather who served as a Circuit Rider preaching in Methodist churches in Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. Paul's grandfather and father followed as Methodist ministers as did his brother. This provided the setting for his long-term involvement with the United Methodist Youth Fellowship. Parallel has been his work with the Boy Scouts and he has recently taught classes for youth and adults at First Church..

Paul is otherwise self-employed as a graphic/web design consultant and has held computer science positions with NASA and related technology firms. He is the 'techie' behind the website for First United Methodist Church, by the way. Welcome, Paul!

Who Are We ?

I can remember that fifty years ago the river front property on the south side of the west end of the Ross Island Bridge was industrial property. I suppose it was because it was such an eye-sore that through urban renewal, or some other procedure, the city was able to vacate it and make possible the development heralded today by towering construction cranes and presumably an aerial tram to OHSU. Over a hundred years ago it was part of what was called South Portland and it was an industrial neighborhood, "the wrong side of the tracks," populated largely by recent immigrants to the United States. Methodism tried to serve the area by a "South Portland Mission," largely sponsored by our church (then at [SW] 3rd and Taylor). The Mission became the responsibility of the Conference Women's Home Missionary Society, which among other things established an "industrial refuge home," a "home away from home" for girls and young working women, aimed particularly at serving the underprivileged and poor. Eventually the Mission renamed itself the "Portland Settlement Center," and had a Sunday School, "Girl Reserves" club, a gym and an "Americanization" program to help immigrants acclimate to their new country in language and other ways, and organized a new M.E. Church which was oriented toward ministries of social welfare. It also had a day-care center. By the 20s it had a paid staff of ten persons and needed larger quarters and money was raised for a handsome three story brick building at [SW] Front and Hooker, named for the largest donor, "The Helen Kelly Manley Community Center." At every step lay persons from this church, by then in the building at [SW] 12 and Taylor, were active as Board members and volunteers (one of our physicians conducted a weekly free medical clinic). Unfortunately, the building of Harbor Drive and connecting it with Front Street (all now Naito Parkway) and connecting it with the Ross Island Bridge and Barbur Blvd. in 1947 isolated the building (which can still be seen from Naito at Hooker), making its location very awkward for its purpose, and the Center was closed and the building sold. The stained glass windows and furniture from its Chapel went to the Goodwill Industries Chapel (another institution of Methodist lineage), and the proceeds from the sale went to a similar work then being carried on in another industrial neighborhood, Linnton.
