
LOOKING TO SERVE

“What if the Census Bureau changed its mission?” wondered Donald Grant.* When they knock on your door instead of asking *who* and *how many* live in your house ask, “What sort of person lives here?” Grant pondered what would need to be considered:

1. What do you treasure?
2. What do you rejoice over?
3. What do you retain in glowing memory?
4. What do you lift up, revere, or hold in awe?
5. What do you want to pass on to your children, your children’s children, and to others?
6. What do you want your children to discover for themselves?
7. What fragile dreams do you cradle for fear, that if mislaid or crushed by your clumsiness, it will be lost forever?
8. What do you grieve over?

Perhaps, Grant suggested, your responses will help answer one of life’s basic questions:

Does it make a difference in the way you dedicate your time and energy? Does it show in the way you relate to others—your family, your friends, your neighbors, the strangers you encounter? Is it revealed in the way you spend your money?

Who Are We ? Dr. Raymond E. Balcomb

A new set of door handles has been scheduled for installation on the southern exterior glass doors to the Chapel/Choir Room narthex (rotunda), and should be in place by the time you read this. They are a memorial to Elrose B. Pearson, an out-of-town relative of a member of this congregation, and they are worthy of your making the necessary effort to look at the next time you are at the church building. They came about because the architect who designed this latest part of our church building was curiously insensitive to the desirability of and possibilities for Christian symbolism. The handles he specified, therefore, were right out of some commercial catalogue -- one can see their like a dozen times over in any shopping mall. The memorial handles, however, have specific biblical and Christiana overtones. And they are unique; there are none exactly like them in the known world. A couple of ideas were suggested by the donor; and a member of this congregation, Gale Morris, designed and fabricated them. Gale is a retired industrial designer and his talents and skill have helped us before (such as in the fixture holding the historic bell in the narthex), and we simply cannot express in words the debt all in this congregation owe to him. The handles and push bars themselves incorporate two symbols: water and fish. They are not meant to stress that fish swim in water! Water itself is one of the rich symbols of the Bible. Christians associate it most, I suppose, with baptism, but that does not exhaust it by any means! Water is always especially valuable in a dry land and water was valuable enough to be sold on the streets of ancient Jerusalem (much as people buy bottled water even in damp Portland). Its value and its cleansing power presumably are what made it popular for religious ablutions, even libations, in many religions (you still have to wash your hands to go in the Moslem "Dome of the Rock" on Temple Moun, for example and Hindus use it for daily sacrifices). It also has cosmic dimensions. All the old near-eastern theories about Creation (cf. Genesis 1:2, 6, 7; Is 40:12; Ps 33:7; Job 38:8-11) involve "waters." I am out of space. More next time. But take a look at the new door handles at your first opportunity!

(There will be a dedication of the new handles on Sunday, October 30, 2005, following worship.)

TAKING ACTION: HEALTH CARE

Oregon is in a health care crisis. Over 600,000 people in our state, including over 100,000 children, are currently without health insurance. The high cost of health care coverage is forcing many employers to reduce or eliminate healthcare coverage for employees or require higher employee-paid premiums. Many families are without basic health insurance. County health clinic funds have been cut. A growing number of people without health care insurance are forced to use the emergency rooms of local hospitals or the Oregon Health Plan as the avenue to medical care. The consequences are serious: preventable major illness creates huge medical bills; death rates for uninsured are higher; and children go without care for ear infections and asthma.

First UMC and other organizations are working together through the Metropolitan Alliance for the Common Good (MACG) to address these and other issues. First steps include educating our congregations and collecting information. Over the next several weeks our MACG Core Team will be collecting information from our congregation to determine just how we are affected by the health care challenge facing our community. Please look for these surveys in late October. Our information will be merged with data from other MACG members and used to develop a strategy to expand access to health care. Also, please visit the MACG Core Team table in the The Commons in Collins.

TAKING ACTION: ENDANGERED SPECIES

A new, national collaboration of faith groups has been established called the "Noah Alliance," which views protection of endangered species from extinction as a responsibility and privilege of people of faith. Please stop by the Planet Church Committee's table at the Commons in Collins Hall, Sunday, October 23, after church to learn more about endangered species, the Endangered Species Act, and ways to make a difference. TAKING ACTION: HUNGER TASK FORCE

First UMC's Church and Society for Social Justice Committee has commissioned a Task Force on Hunger. The task force will consist of 8-9 members whose charge will be to examine the major issues and needs regarding hunger in Oregon and beyond and identify ways in which our congregation can respond through outreach and social justice work.

The task force will report back to Church and Society with recommendations and an action plan by a date to be determined. The work of the task force is expected to take 6-8 weeks. The Hurricane Relief Task Force made a number of recommendations to the First Church Leadership Council concerning our church's response to the recent tragedy in the Gulf Coast region. In addition to the over \$38,000 that First Church has already been sent for hurricane relief efforts in the Gulf Coast region, we will be:

- Collecting school supplies through Sunday, October 23 to send to the UMCOR Sager Brown facility in Louisiana (Boxes for these kits are available in the narthex if you'd like to contribute or see Agnes Zach for more information)
- Setting up a partner church relationship with a church in the region affected by this disaster and developing specific ways to assist in their rebuilding effort.
- Linking our commitment to provide relief with our advocacy to see that the needs of the poorest families and children are being addressed.
- Sending a Volunteers in Mission Team to the Gulf Coast in 2006 to help with rebuilding.
- Providing information related to disaster education and preparedness for our own congregation.
- Providing regular updates to the congregation on what we are doing as a church to respond and provide on-going opportunities for those who are interested in being involved in the rebuilding effort.

You will be hearing more about each of these efforts in the coming months.
