In fact, I often hear people say how the Commons has created an opportunity for us to become more of a community. CONFIRMATION Q&A MEETING

The First United Methodist Youth program is gearing up for winter/spring confirmation classes. Confirmation this year will be geared to 7th and 8th graders, as well as older youth who have not yet been through the class. The program will begin January 8, 2006. There will be six Confirmation class sessions, followed by two sessions in which each student in the program will be matched with a mentor from the congregation. Confirmation Sunday will take place on March 19th, 2006.

In confirmation we will learn about and discuss our relationship with God; various aspects of worship, including the rituals and traditions that are a part of the Christian life; the meaning of Jesus' life; the importance of spiritual practices and disciplines; what it means to be a United Methodist today; and the various expressions of a life of faith. We hope that you will want to be involved in this important experience.

We will hold an orientation session for students and parents on Sunday, December 4th from noon to 1:00 PM in the Fireside Room, following the worship service. Who Are We ?

Leading into an explanation of the “water” and “fish” symbols in the new handles on the southern exterior door of the Chapel/Choir Room narthex, I made an unnecessary and ill-advised remark about the architect for that most recent addition to our building, and there were some readers who noticed it and were offended. I hereby apologize to him and to all who were offended by the harshness of my off-the-cuff censoriousness. I remember well the lecture he gave to us when the Chapel/Choir Room was complete, and how he pointed out the symbolism of its being a square room. The ancients thought there was something perfect about a square (and, also, interestingly enough, about a circle) and that symbolism appears in the Bible. John’s vision of utopia - God’s perfect society to be established at the end of time, you remember -- is a city that “lies foursquare, its length the same as its width.” (Rev. 21:16), and every time we go in the Chapel we should be reminded of our destiny. He also noted that there were twelve pilasters (pseudo columns) and twelve, of course in the Old Testament always reminds us of the twelve Tribes of Israel, and in the New Testament of the twelve Disciples. And so on. His own description of the symbolism he employed is framed and mounted in the Chapel Narthex. All this got me to thinking about one of the symbolic ideas in our building which went wrong. When the Tower was built, I and some of the members of the Committee thought it would be a fine idea to have some symbols which could be changed periodically (with the season of the Church Year, if I remember correctly). The architect obligingly designed a three-cornered device at the very top, with removable panels, incorporating ideas we suggested. But, alas, the panels were really more than a single custodian could safely handle at that height, especially when it was windy. So we only changed them about one time. Moreover, their symbolism wasn’t all that great. I haven’t looked at the top when approaching the church on SE 18th in a long time, but the one I think is there is an “alpha” and “omega” over an outline of our cornerstone rock in Beckham Court. We thought it very unique and admirable, but the first person who noticed it without being told what it was, thought it meant we thought the beginning and end was a gold nugget! So I am in a very poor position to be casting stones at others about the use of symbolism!


SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR KATRINA SUCCESSFUL
