Jesus loved telling stories to get his point across. One story he tells is of what my childhood Bible called "The Happy Farmer." EDUCATION, EVOLUTION, AND INTELLIGENT DESIGN: HOW BIOLOGISTS ADDRESS INTELLIGENT DESIGN THEORY

Global Warming: A Scientific and Political Update

There has been a recent shift from debating if global warming is happening to debating strategies to combat it. How can we make immediate, dramatic and steady changes reducing global warming pollution so as to prevent a runaway climate catastrophe? Our guest speaker will update us on this crucial discussion about the future of our planet. He is Dr. Eban Goodstein, professor of Economics at Lewis and Clark College. He has written and spoken extensively on this issue and is the volunteer coordinator of a national mobilization against global warming. Their national volunteer Speakers Network includes over 250 citizens in more than 33 states available to speak at no charge about global warming pollution, climate change policy and the path to a clean energy future.

REACHING OUT

Outreach Ministry at First Church involves our faithful response to local and global issues. It is reflected in a variety of ways: covenant relationships with missionaries around the world; education and advocacy related to matters of justice based on Jesus' model of compassion; and efforts to create a society in which all of God's children can live in peace. 
