They are said to be the epitome of jigsaw puzzles—challenging and elegant. Stave Puzzles are produced in a small shop in Vermont.* All are hand cut from fine wood with hand painted pictures. Each puzzle comes in its own simple blue and green box—some may be as few as 75 pieces—others thousands. They are not cheap. Prices range from several hundred to tens of thousands of dollars. Assembling them can be daunting—they may include “dropouts” (empty spaces that no pieces fill), “phony corners” (pieces that look like corners but fit into the interior), and “whammies” (abutting pieces that take a third piece to lock them into place.) More sophisticated models include layer pieces that ‘pop-up’ or 3-D components. Stave has even been known to produce an ‘April Fool’ puzzle for regular customers that contain pieces that will not fit no matter what you try.

Some of the puzzles have a straightforward solution, others can be snapped together in many ways—but only one is correct. But once correctly assembled, the pieces fit so closely and strong that the puzzle can be picked up without fear of it falling apart. There is, however, one consistent dilemma with a Staves puzzle. Staves never provides a picture to help the customer solve it. The best you can do is invite someone else to help.

A friend and colleague, Dr. Glenn Davidson used to say that our lives are like a giant jigsaw puzzle. This pastor, physician and psychiatrist suggested that our knowledge, experiences and feelings are pieces that we carefully assemble into a pattern of meaning and purpose that gives us balance and identity. Put together carefully, the puzzle is strong and durable. However, when we are struck with trauma (illness, death, an accident, betrayal, emotional turmoil, and the like) the puzzle we have been carefully assembling gets tossed up, the pieces scatter, and we have to go about the business of putting it together again—sometimes with new parts! And, just like a Stave puzzle, there is no picture to help us get it back together right.

Thankfully, there are some people who can help us when we need to reassemble our spiritual and emotional lives. For some, those are close friends, confidants, even family. Others find it helpful to share the challenge with capable professionals.

A vital—but sometimes overlooked—source of help in our congregation is the Samaritan Counseling Center. For many years Portland’s Samaritan program has placed highly skilled professionals to counsel from our building (their office is just above the Max entrance.) Many clients find that their health insurance can offset the hourly cost of counseling—much like they pay for physician visits. Others are not adequately insured, and so this program can offer reduction in fees. This is possible because they keep their overhead low and seek grants and contributions.

Last week it was announced that three counselors will be working from our offices on alternate days. *The Rev. Dr. Penny Christianson* holds a doctorate in Psychology and is an ordained United Methodist Minister who has worked with addictions, losses, job-related issues as well as marriage and relationship stresses. (She has made available a wonderful series of ‘help’ brochures in our narthex literature rack—check them out!) *Leslie Williams, LPC* specializes (among other things) in issues particular to people who are gay/lesbian/bisexual/transgender or questioning. *Mark Weinmeister, MSW, LCSW* also has wide experience—but some special experience working with adolescents.

Hopefully the puzzle that is you is so well assembled that it’s beauty and strength will serve you a lifetime. But, should something unexpected cause it to fall apart; it’s nice to know that there are people to help you put it back together—even without a picture!

HEALTH CARE FORUM FOLLOW UP

The Health Care Forum on February 12 was a huge success. It got many of us to thinking about how to significantly improve the current "broken health care system." Many signatures were gathered for Ballot Initiative Measure No. 40; a measure designed to place into the Oregon Constitution an "obligation for the state to ensure that every Oregon resident has access to effective and affordable health care as a fundamental right." By law, the amendment will, "require the state legislative assembly to adopt a plan that incrementally expands health care coverage not later than July 1, 2009." 
LENTEN SERVICE PROJECTS BIG SUCCESS
