Those who receive God's love are called to share it with others. One important way we do that is through our Special Easter Offering.

I do not know the name of the young artist/theologian who submitted her work in Sunday's offering plate, but it is a concise summary of the message of Holy Week—the most sacred week on our Christian calendar.

That week we remember the greatest love story ever told. It is the passion of a God whose love for creation endures even denial. It is the tale of a divine love that is so steadfast and deep that even the injustice and hatred of Jesus' trial and crucifixion could not stop it. But finally, it is the victory of a love that even death could not stop—a love that lives forever. It is the epic of God's love for us—and our love for God.

Please ponder that love!

We'll begin our remembrance next **Sunday, April 9** during our **10:30 AM Palm Sunday Worship Service**. Our children will lead us in re-creating Christ's entry into Jerusalem amid cheering crowds waving palm branches. Then we'll hear the story of that week told dramatically in word and scripture.

Then on **Maundy Thursday** evening, **April 13 at 7:00 PM in the Sanctuary** we will remember the Last Supper as we share the Sacrament of Communion in our Sanctuary. Music will be provided by our Chancel Choir.

At **noon on Good Friday, April 14** we will be gathering with other downtown congregations for an **Ecumenical Good Friday Service** at First United Church of Christ, Congregational, 1126 SW Park. A number of clergy will lead the worship. Dr. Rodney Paige, retired Executive Director of Church World Service and Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon will preach.

Good Friday Evening, April 14 at 7:00 PM we will gather to remember the crucifixion and death of our Lord by the powerful Tenebrae: A Service of Darkness **in our chapel**.


Craft Fair & BOOK SALE

RECYCLING REVAMPED AT FIRST CHURCH

Planet Church, with the help of Portland's Office of Sustainable Development, is taking a fresh approach to recycling at First Church...maybe you've noticed it. The blue recycling wastebaskets which have been a fixture for years are in the process of being replaced by cardboard recycling containers-small, for offices and classrooms; and large for the bigger common rooms. What goes into the containers is changing too. Now, everything recyclable can go into one bin...except glass. Glass can be recycled in the appropriate large blue containers in the hallway by the 202 kitchen, or in the large Collins Hall kitchen. So what can go into the combined containers? Papers of all sorts; cardboard; plastic bottles and cans (aluminum and "tin"). Please DON'T put frozen food packaging or material containing food or drink waste (including coffee cups) into the recycling. Our hope is that this will make recycling simpler and more convenient than ever. But there's more to it than that. The Social Principles of the United Methodist Church remind us to "recognize the responsibility of the church and its members to place a high priority on changes in economic, political, social, and technological lifestyles to support a more ecologically equitable and sustainable world leading to a higher quality of life for all of God's creation."

Please join us in the discipline of recycling at church...one of many ways we can make a difference in caring for God's Earth, our home.

NEW J.G. NORDWALL ORGAN EDUCATION FUND RECIPIENT CHOSEN

In 2001, as a part of the 150th anniversary of Portland's First United Methodist Church, an endowment fund was created and named to honor the artistry and years of dedication to the church given by Jonas Nordwall, our organist for over 30 years. He has enhanced the overall worship experience of persons who have attended this church over that time frame. The interest from that endowment is to be used by a person desiring to further their interests and enhancing their ability to become a church organist by providing personalized education from Nordwall. For the past two years Elizabeth Wright has taken lessons from Nordwall, and is presently employed as the organist/choir director of Piedmont Presbyterian Church.

We are very pleased to announce that a grant has been offered to and accepted by Joy Novak as the second person to have the use of the scholarship for the next two years. Novak is a graduate of Oregon State University with a B.S. in Business Administration and a Minor in Music. She has her own piano teaching studio and is a member of the Oregon Music Teachers Association. She has played classical piano for 22 years and is currently the accompanist for worship services at the Hillsboro United Methodist Church. She says in part, "As a member of the church's music team, my personal goal is to help maintain and attract interest in our wonderful church in the only way I know how - through a quality music program. I feel that the music played during worship services plays a major role in inspiring faith in our current members as well as attracting new members. By becoming accomplished at the organ, I hope to accompany our congregation in singing the powerful and magnificent hymns - and inspire faith in God."
