A few weeks ago our church Board of Trustees spent several thousand dollars of our “General Endowment Fund” earnings to buy some high tech equipment that I hope we’ll never use. It was, I think, a wise investment!

They purchased two “AEDs”—automatic external defibrillators—and installed one near the sanctuary and the other near Collins Hall. An AED is an emergency medical device designed to administer a life-saving electrical shock to sustain a victim of cardiac arrest or arrhythmia until paramedics arrive. Similar devices have been standard equipment in hospital emergency rooms for many years. Advances in computerization have made them small, relatively inexpensive, and virtually foolproof. They are showing up more and more in airports, businesses, in public places, and now, in church.

They first came to our attention a year or so ago when one of our lay leaders, Rick Fortner, brought a demonstration unit. Fortner, himself, had been the victim of a sudden cardiac event and knew first hand that when a heart event strikes, proper aid must be administered within minutes to prevent serious brain impairment or death. His concerns were underscored by two respected physicians, Dr. Paul Schipper and Dr. Kenton Gregory, who assured us of the need for the units. Indeed, Dr. Schipper helped identify the best models to purchase—and even offered to help install them!

Training is the next step. The majority of our staff spent an afternoon in CPR training that included the use of AEDs. We anticipate sessions for ushers and other leaders in the near future.

The AED’s are amazing devices—barely larger than a school lunchbox. They are both powerful—yet filled with safeguards. Simple instructions and clear illustrations are prominent—but a clear computerized voice carefully leads the user through the proper steps. There are built-in detection devices that test the condition of the victim’s heart function before anything happens. If a defibrating shock is not needed—or would be harmful—the devices lock in order to prevent inappropriate application.

We never know when we might be confronted with the need to come to someone’s aid. Ask Sally Townend, Virginia’s daughter and a long-time member here. She was designated a “Modern Mac Hero” last summer by the Multnomah Athletic Club after she came upon a woman suffering a seizure and cardiac arrest while visiting in Olympia, Washington. Fortunately there was an emergency AED nearby and Townend quickly administered two shocks prior to the arrival of paramedics. The woman has recovered and is doing well—thanks to the alert Samaritan and an AED.

I hope I never have to use ours. But I’m glad they are there!

We regret the problem and extend our apologies. We will make every effort to prevent this from happening in future services.

ENERGY CONSERVATION

On Tuesday, May 11 from 12 to 4:30 PM. First Church will host "Green Building and Renovations for Congregations." Registration will begin at 11:30 AM in Room 202. A light lunch will be served. This practical workshop is designed to help congregations save money and care for the earth. Topics will include the ethics of energy stewardship, an overview of principles of energy-efficient building, Energy Trust of Oregon and Oregon Office of Energy programs and resources, how to work with contractors and architects, generating energy on-site, and financing and rebate opportunities available to congregations. It is presented by Oregon Interfaith Power & Light (OIPL), Oregon Office of Energy and Energy Trust of Oregon.

who are we?

history & archives

We are grateful to people who, evidently after going through some long-unused material, or cleaning a drawer, or something, find something about the First United Methodist Church and bring it to the church office. The Archives and History Committee has a "cubbyhole" there which I try to clean out every month or so. The last time I looked there was a document dated, "8, February, 1976" signed by the members of the 7th and 8th grade church school class and their teachers. What it said was: "To Those it may Concern, We the 7th and 8th graders have buried a time capsule in the year 1976, in the cement box where the two pine trees are growing. This box is in the courtyard between the narthex wing and the Sunday school wing." It also had a diagram showing the location. I remember that bit of landscape architecture well. It is now covered by the Chapel/Choir Room. My question is, did anyone on the Staff or the Building Committee ever hear of this? That is, when the last building expansion was undertaken, did the contractor who took those trees out and leveled that spot to put in a new concrete slab ever come across this "time capsule" and turn it in, or has it been lost (or obscured) forever? I feel a little bit of personal embarrassment about this, because it was originally buried on "my watch" as senior pastor, and I presume they either asked my permission or at least notified me of the project, but I have absolutely no recollection of it. If I had remembered I would have alerted the Building Committee and it could have been saved and perhaps opened at our 150th celebration in 1997-98. My guess is that it was lost in the excavation and hauled away. If there are any members of that class - or anyone else, who remember it - perhaps at least some of what it contained, I hope they will let me know. It would be interesting information to have in our archives.
