Moral and ethical issues seldom come wrapped in crystal clear packaging tied with strings of certainty—at least the ones that matter don't. That fact struck me so bluntly when a member wondered why our church—and our conference—had not spoken boldly against gambling.

Our Social Principles certainly mince no words:

Gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interests of moral, social, economic, and spiritual life, and destructive of good government. As an act of faith and concern, Christians should abstain from gambling and should strive to minister to those victimized by the practice. Where gambling has become addictive, the Church will encourage such individuals to receive therapeutic assistance so that the individual's energies may be redirected into positive and constructive ends. The Church should promote standards and personal lifestyles that would make unnecessary and undesirable the resort to commercial gambling—including public lotteries—as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue or funds for support of charities or government.

(The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 2004, The United Methodist Publishing House, Paragraph 163G.)

Yet, for 14, years this state has sanctioned public lotteries and electronic gaming with a portion of the proceeds bringing revenue to help fund public education. If media reports are accurate, many restaurants and bars depend on their 'cut' from state lotteries and video poker to keep their doors open.

Native governments have asserted their sovereignty and operate casinos in several places around the state. One of the most controversial issues in this year's election is the expansion of gaming into the Columbia Gorge. In addition, backed by gaming money, tribal leaders have supported political candidates, explored building a big-league baseball stadium in Portland, and were listed as a major sponsor of Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's annual banquet held last week at the Hilton.

I understand that a group of investors—not native American—are considering development of the old greyhound racing track in Wood Village as a casino.

Gambling addictions continue to be a major cause of personal and family problems in Oregon.

While legalized gambling has become more and more a fixture in our community, the churches' opposition has been largely confined to a paragraph in a denominational publication that is seldom spoken aloud. Is it because this seemingly straightforward moral issue masks complex questions that defy simple conclusions?

It is a shame that our state must turn to games of chance and prey on those addicted to gambling to fund basic services. But funding public services is a knotty issue. People of faith and values have not expended much energy, let alone coalesced, around meaningful alternatives to pay the cost of public education, community safety, mental and physical health, and support for the needy.

The proud men and women whose ancestors first inhabited this land have endured centuries of racism, economic exploitation, broken treaties as well as cultural and geographic dislocation. Tragically, many native nations are forced to depend on recreational gambling and its related hospitality industry for economic sustenance. People of faith and values have exerted little effort and energy to find economic alternatives—let alone seriously address the broader justice issues.

Maybe we don't speak more boldly because, at some level, we are a bit entranced by the lure of chance and "lady luck." Christendom does not think with one mind on this matter. Some communions embrace bingo and other gaming in their programs. Who among us has not yielded to the hope for a quick buck with a lottery ticket or a nickel slot machine—or a weekend in Vegas? Too often our congregations have succumbed to door prizes, drawings or sweepstakes to add a little "fun" to church events.

In a few weeks United Methodists from across the state will gather in Nampa, Idaho for our Annual Conference Sessions. Among the matters under consideration is our moral witness to a state entranced by gambling. It could be a lively and engaging discussion! Are we willing to talk about it?

FOR THE PEACE OF THE WORLD


When: Through June 4 - From 9:15 to 10:15 AM in Room 204

PRIMETIMERS RETURN FROM BRAZIL

The Methodist Church of Brazil takes John Wesley's principles seriously. Its goal, according to the National Plan of the Methodist Church in Brazil (2001), is to witness God's justice, God's plan for humanity, and God's mercy. Children are a primary focus of this mission. First UMC members Pat and Cal Brockman, Colleen and Tom Foster and Dee Poujade were privileged to see the Brazilian Methodist Church in action when they recently participated in a Primetimers event, hosted by long-term GBGM missionaries Gordon and Teca Greathouse.

Shade and Fresh Water (*Sombra e Agua Fresca*) was developed to protect children who would otherwise become street children, at the mercy of exploitative adults. Because children only attend school four hours a day, the Project is designed to provide children ages 6-14 with a safe environment in which they can learn about God, receive help with their studies and participate in enrichment activities, such as music, dance, computers and crafts. The San Gabriel Community Center, started by the Greathouses early in their mission work, has become a prototype for the more than 50 Shade and Fresh Water projects that now operate throughout Brazil.

Some of the projects are small in scope - but all are large in heart. One that the Primetimers group visited was housed in a church of 135 members - yet it offered care for 50 children (25 each in the morning and afternoon), utilizing volunteers almost exclusively to operate its program!

During their two weeks in Brazil, the Primetimers also visited Methodist churches, schools, and a homeless shelter that serves up to 400 people every day. They also visited the colonial mining town of Ouro Preto, rode a cog wheel train to see Rio de Janeiro's famous Christ the Redeemer statue, and enjoyed the warm hospitality of the Brazilian people.
