

THIRD GRADE BIBLE SUNDAY, JANUARY 21, 2007

Dr. Martin Luther King is, to me, a hero.

It is not that he was a perfect person. But, then, neither was Moses, or David, or Peter or Paul-or so many of the heroes of our faith.

It was not that he accomplished everything he wanted. His campaigns against poverty and the Vietnam War were barely launched before his life was snuffed out by an assassin's bullet.

He was a spiritual giant-afire with faith in God and passionately committed to justice, equality and peace.

He was a visionary who moved the soul of our nation and gave the world a dream and a hope.

He was an agent of change who loosed the powers of non-violent love against prejudice, hatred and oppression.

Journalist Karen Pritzker is somewhat of an expert when it comes to heroes. Her website (www.myhero.com) offers a place for anyone to share stories of those who have inspired us and others. More than a million people visit the site each month. Their stories, Pritzker concludes have taught her that, "...a single stone thrown in a pond can produce ripples that extend farther than anyone can imagine at the moment of impact...there's no measure of the lives it will touch." * The ripples of Dr. King's life continue to touch and transform lives. That's why I am glad we pause each year to remember him, to test the quality of our justice today, and to give thanks for God's Spirit flowing through the heroes among us.

new irs guidelines by Christine Bostick, business manager

The IRS has released some new guidelines for donations to charities that we would like you to be aware of. To deduct any charitable donation of money, a taxpayer must have a bank record, such as a bank statement or credit card billing or a written receipt from the charity showing the name of the organization, the date and amount of the donation.

If you donate cash, please be sure your name is included on the envelope so we can properly record the donation. We do send out statements showing the amount of money we receive.

You can make your donations via electronic funds transfer from your checking or savings account. You also have the option of charging your donation on your Visa or Mastercard. If you would like more information on these easy payment methods, please call the office.

Prior law allowed taxpayers to back up their donations of money with personal bank registers, diaries or notes made around the time of the donation. Those types of records are no longer sufficient.

The new provision applies to contributions made in taxable years beginning after August 17, 2006. For taxpayers that file returns on a calendar-year basis, including most individuals, the new provision applies to contributions made beginning in January of 2007.

health care and prescription drugs

THE TIME IS NOW: FIXING THE BROKEN HEALTH CARE SYSTEM!

A Health Care Forum is scheduled on Sunday, February 4 in the Fireside Room, beginning with lunch at 12:15 PM, kids are welcome to eat lunch with us followed by a staffed "kid care" time. The forum will be over by 2:00 PM.

The forum celebrates the recently passed, Oregon Prescription Plan (OPDP), a very meaningful success. There will also be presentations regarding the next step to be taken, passage of health care legislation during the 6 month Oregon State legislative session that begins on January 7 in Salem. The following health care initiatives being introduced in the legislature include the Archimedes Movement, the Oregon Senate Plan, others not yet known, and the Healthy American's Plan, being introduced in the U.S. Congress by Oregon's Senator Wyden. The presentations will be followed by a question and answer period with the presenters: Cheryl Bittle, Debbie Fisher, Dick Pomeroy and Mary Beth Healy, from Oregonians for Health Security. Lowell Greathouse will be the moderator.

After the question and answer period there will be a discussion on how one can help make Fixing the broken health care system a reality. This will be led by Mary Beth Healy and Dick Pomeroy.

ELIGIBLE FOR THE OREGON PRESCRIPTION DRUG PROGRAM?

All Oregonians without drug insurance, regardless of age or income, are now eligible for prescription drug discounts through the state's expanded prescription drug plan. To get an application, call 1-888-411-6737 or go to the website www.odpd.org. There is no cost to individuals, and older Medicare beneficiaries who fall into the Medicare Part D "doughnut hole" are also eligible to join. There is a notebook with additional information available in the church library.

Here are some of the new titles in the First Church Library:

Middle Church, by Bob Edgar - National Council of Churches General Secretary Bob Edgar lays out his progressive vision for America's Mainline Denominations. Best American Spiritual Writing 2006, edited by Philip Zaleski - Author and anthologist Philip Zaleski has scoured the spiritual and secular press to come up with these thirty-plus gems of spiritual memoir.

Gospel of Judas, edited by Rudolphe Kasser, et. al. - Read this "newest" ancient gospel and see for yourself what the hubbub is all about.

Whose Bible is It?, by Jaroslav Pelikan - This look at the development of the Jewish and Christian Bible is the last work of the great biblical scholar, Jaroslav Pelikan who passed away in 2006

The Secret Message of Jesus, by Brian McLaren - This reconsideration of Jesus' vision and message offers an accessible introduction to the thought of "emergent" theologian Brian McLaren.

A Conversation Between Bev Graver and Art Kayser

*(This conversation took place before the congregation on Sunday morning, January 7.
They are discussing the Comparative Pledge Report which is printed on the reverse side..)*

Bev: For this church to continue to provide the programs and service that you, the congregation members, desire to meet your spiritual needs, we need financial support from every household of this church. Many of you have already made a pledge to the church for 2007. Some haven't. You have called upon this church to help provide your spiritual wishes. Providing them comes with a financial cost.

What has the church done over the last few years to finance the essential needs requested of this congregation?

Art: The Comparative Pledge Report shows that our total pledged amount has been pretty flat for the past few years, around \$800,000. That wouldn't be too bad, except the fixed costs like heating, electricity and insurance increased faster than other costs. And then, of course, there are the regular inflation related increases. Consequently, our program costs, staff costs and dollars to missions and outreach have been reduced in each of the last two years. Salary increases have been minimal and more staff members are working part-time. It is a challenge to continue all of our current programs or add new ones.

Bev: Over the last few years, how has our performance been in terms of numbers of pledging households?

Art: The number of pledging households has been going down since 2003. This year we had 669 households who attended at least monthly. 317 households pledged financial support for 2007. That's about one out of two households pledging.

Bev: We are a growing church and the people of this church have put their faith into programs and services that they desire. For this church to fulfill God's needs to this congregation, a pledge commitment from every household is a necessity.

Art: I am also concerned about our future. One-third of our household's givers are 75 years and older. They pledged 37% of our 2007 financial support. In 2006, 19 of our over 75 givers passed away.

Bev: When it comes to a household's pledge amount, to what extent have the pledges been changing?

Art: Well, that's part of the problem too. The number of households reducing or increasing their pledge from the past is down. The number of households pledging the same amount as last year has gone up a lot. Less than 40% of our households increased their pledge for 2007.

Bev: The front page of the Oregonian had headlines saying wages are up, the economy is up. With Oregon's strong economy and economic progress, we would trust that the same economic strength would be evident in increased pledge amounts from households of this church.

What can we do to strengthen our financial support of this church?

Art: We need to spread the load. We need to increase the number of households who financially support our church and make a pledge to do so. People also need to realize that costs do increase over time, and to increase their pledge amounts. Ask yourself: "What is God calling me to give?"

What is the financial impact? Fixed costs continue to increase faster than other costs. Program costs and staff and \$ to missions and outreach have been reduced in the last two years. Salary increases have been minimal.

What about the future? In 2006 we had 689 households who attended at least monthly. 47% of our households pledged financial support for 2007.

33% of our pledging households givers are 75 or older. They provide 37% of our 2007 pledged financial support. In 2006, 19 of our 75 and older givers passed away.

What can we do? Spread the load. Increase the number of households financially supporting our church and making a pledge to do so. Ask what God is calling you to give.

Or further reduce program costs, staff and/or \$ for missions and outreach.
