What-for heaven's sake--are we doing to our children?

Last week the Oregon State Department of Education reported over 15,000 children from families who are homeless are in our school classrooms--an increase of nearly 10% over the previous year. At the same time Federal contribution to funding their education has dropped by 10%. (see release posted at http://chuckcurrie.blogs.com/chuck_currie/2007/09/over-15000-home.html)

In November we'll be asked to approve a controversial tax measure to fund health care for our state's 119,000 uninsured children.

Over 101,000 children each month are hungry and receive emergency food from Oregon Food Banks. (cf.http://www.oregonfoodbank.org/research_and_action/) Paradoxically, childhood obesity, high blood pressure, heart disease and type-2 diabetes are on the rise.

Last Sunday, Mary Sagara reported more than 14 million children -a good share of whom live in our state -are seeking an adult mentor and role model.

In 2006 our state reported 15,076 verified incidents of child neglect and abuse--a 6 % increase over the previous reporting year. (<http://www.oregon.gov/DHS/abuse/publications/children/abusestats2006.pdf>)

Shortly before his death, former Vice President Hubert Humphrey offered a trenchant observation. He said, "...the moral test of Government is how that Government treats those who are in the dawn of life, the children; those who are in the twilight of life, the elderly; and those who are in the shadows of life, the sick, the needy and the handicapped." (accessed at <http://www.quotationspage.com/quote/29565.html>)

It wasn't the first test of morality and compassion.

Two thousand years ago, Jesus told a parable about a king who gave his subjects a test to see who would inherit the kingdom. To pass required those tested to provide food for the hungry, drink for the thirsty, welcome to the stranger, clothes for the naked, care for the sick and visits to prisoners. The people objected, "We have done all these things for you." The ruler countered by saying that wasn't enough. The real test was not about pampering the privileged, but caring for the needy. "Truly, I tell you," he said, "just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40 NRSV)

Using either testing system, the report card with our children is dismal. Can we, who seek the kin-dom of God, be satisfied with these grades?

What-for Christ's sake--will we do for our children--and for God?

**HUNGRY FOR JUSTICE?
CANCEL WORLD DEBT FAST!**

"Must we starve our children to pay our debts?" - Julius Nyerere, former President of Tanzania

Today, millions of men, women, and children around the world are literally starving for debt cancellation.

Africa's over \$200 billion debt burden is the single biggest obstacle to the continent's development. Most of this debt is illegitimate, having been incurred by despotic and unrepresentative regimes. The US and other rich countries have restricted calls to cancel this debt, instead proposing partial solutions that are inadequate and impose harsh economic policies on indebted countries.

The 2007 Jubilee Act (HR 2634) would provide expanded debt cancellation for many countries that were not included in the 2005 G8 agreement and that need debt cancellation to address extreme poverty. Moving the Jubilee Act through Congress is the central goal of a rolling 40-day fast for debt reduction currently taking place.

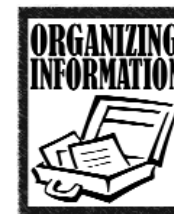

Some years ago now, I used E. Stanley Jones' classic work *Growing Spiritually*, as a part of my morning meditation time. Jones was an able, thoughtful guide who lived from 1884 to 1973 and had much to offer ordinary people in their search to grow in Christian maturity. Here's one example of Jones' insights: "Everybody surrenders to something—each group did (in Jesus' day). The Zealots to resistance, the Essenes to retreat, the Pharisees to incasement, the Sadducees to materialism, the Herodians to power. The Christians surrendered to Christ. But having surrendered to Christ, they surrendered to nothing else ... They faced everything and they used everything—sorrow, loss, opposition, life—everything—and made something else out of it. The cross became their one dear symbol, and it stood for the worst becoming the best, the darkest becoming the lightest, and the cruelest becoming the most contributive ... Life was not dodged; it was developed." (*Growing Spiritually*, page 328)

climate change

planet church

Planet Church takes seriously the biblical call to stewardship. We are stewards of our homes, our state, and our nation. Now the planet needs our stewardship to address global climate change.

The average global surface temperature in the year 2100 will likely be 2.5 to 10.8 degrees Fahrenheit higher than 1990. The average arctic winter temperature has already increased by 11 degrees Fahrenheit. The northern polar ice cap has decreased in thickness by 40% and in extent by 6% over the past 40 years. It is expected to completely melt within 50 years. Ocean sea levels are rising. A study published in Nature concluded that climate change could put 25% of all land animals and plants on a path towards extinction over the next 50 years. There are more very hot summers and more forest fires.

The main cause of global climate change is the amount of carbon dioxide building up in our atmosphere. This buildup comes from more people on the planet consuming and transporting more people and things and needing cheap energy to do so.

Planet Church launched a task force more than six months ago to investigate how our building was receiving and using energy. The task force found that a major operating expense of the church is consumption of electricity and natural gas. Efforts are underway to change out light bulbs, look for energy savings with our appliances, change to "on demand" water heating systems, examine our windows and insulation, and see that energy considerations figure in decisions about our buildings.

An additional solution is to reduce the amount of carbon dioxide by installing other technologies than burning oil and natural gas. The Federal Government and Oregon recently have provided very significant incentives to enable businesses and homeowners to consider solar photovoltaic systems. The task force is considering a recommendation to place solar panels on our south facing roofs that would result in significant electrical energy savings. Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon has designed a program to allow churches to receive the solar energy and business to take advantage of the tax credits and other benefits in order to make solar energy feasible at this time. The committee is looking closely at this program.

Because everybody uses energy, stewardship requires each of us to look at our "carbon footprint" to see if it can be reduced. As a faith community First UMC is stepping up to this requirement.
