It's not clear who first coined it—but it's worth pondering nevertheless:

“Insanity is doing the same things over and over again and expecting different results!”

Each New Year's millions of us reflect their choices—their 'life solutions'—and find 'resolutions' for those that aren't working well.

The idea of New Year's resolutions predates Jesus' birth by more than 150 years back to the time the Roman calendar fixed the turn of the year as January 1. The month is named after the mythical god-king named Janus who was reputed to have two faces, which allowed him to look both forward and backward in battle. January became a time to look back and reflect on the past, then turn and resolve to embrace better ways in the future.

For those who take resolutions seriously it can be pretty effective. Not long ago a research group interviewed 300,000 people about their New Year's commitments. They were surprised to find that nearly half of all Americans make resolutions each year. The questioners recalled their list again six months later. They anticipated many of those resolutions would be broken or forgotten—but they were surprised. 46% of those who made a list were keeping them. That was 10 times the success rate of those who wanted to change, but had not made a resolution! *

My faith and pastoral experience though, tell me it's not as simple as that. Despite our best of intentions, our most determined efforts, we generally fall short of our goals. Change—deep meaningful change—cannot happen unless we align our hearts and our efforts with a divine power that is stronger and more enduring than our own. Fortunately that strength and that power infuses creation with grace and hope.

Perhaps that is why I have repeatedly found my heart lifted by resolutions in the form of a prayer offered a few years ago by Rabbi Harold S. Kushner.

Let the rain come and wash away the ancient grudges,
the bitter hatreds held and nurtured over generations.

Let the rain wash away the memory of the hurt, the neglect.
Then let the sun come out and fill the sky with rainbows.

Let the warmth of the sun heal us wherever we are broken.
Let it burn away the fog so that we can see each other clearly.
So that we can see beyond labels, beyond accents, gender or skin color.

Let the warmth and brightness of the sun melt our selfishness.
So that we can share the joys and feel the sorrows of our neighbors.

And let the light of the sun be so strong that we will see all people as our neighbors.

Let the earth, nourished by rain, bring forth flowers to surround us with beauty.
And let the mountains teach our hearts to reach upward to heaven. **

Amen

By God's grace—and our resolution—it could be!


