Ethan Sperry,
Chancel Choir conductor



We welcome **Ethan Sperry** as the conductor of our Chancel Choir. He will begin his ministry at First Church with the Annual Chancel Choir Retreat on September 10 -11, 2010.

Born in New York City, Ethan began studying conducting at the age of eight, cello at the age of twelve, and singing at the age of eighteen. He has earned a bachelor's degree in Philosophy from Harvard College and Masters and Doctoral degrees in Choral Conducting from the University of Southern California. Ensembles under his direction have toured extensively around the world and have performed at major venues in the United States. He serves as a consultant for the KM Music Conservatory in Chennai, the first classical music school in India, which opened in 2009.

Currently Ethan is Director of Choral Activities at Portland State University where he conducts choruses and teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting. An enthusiastic cook, Sperry has won awards for his baking and his recipes have been printed in *Bon Appetit* and the *Cincinnati Enquirer*.

Kristen Sellers and Spencer Roberts have been this summer’s “Greathouse Community Interns” (renamed last June in honor of Dr. Lowell Greathouse). Their reports are inspiring.

Sellers who has been working with Northwest Portland Ministries reports:

John Wesley, Methodism’s founder, set a high standard for those who follow:

“Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can to all the people you can, as long as you can!”

That rule has inspired First Churches’ ministries. Let me share just one example. For forty years we have deployed summer interns to work in not-for profit community service organizations in the metro area. This year is no exception.

“Working at Northwest Portland Ministries has been a great learning experience for me. About 60% of my time is direct service and 40% is office work. I have had a lot of different administrative experiences from which I’ve learned a lot. These have included: writing a mini-grant for a 9/11 service project (which looks like it will be funded); researching different companies that have matching grant programs; helping to get items for the auction that is occurring on October 23rd; updating the online database by entering organizations and clients; answering phones which usually entails scheduling rides for people or signing them up for field trips. I have enjoyed the many challenges I’ve had at Northwest Portland Ministries.”

Roberts was assigned to Neighborhood House. He writes:

“I was directly involved with their Schools Uniting Neighborhoods (SUN) Program this summer. At Portsmouth K-8 and George Middle School, the program works much like a summer school or a camp would run. In the morning the children have rigorous class studies in reading, math or writing. The idea behind this is to help the children who have fallen behind or need extra help retain what they learned during the school year so when school starts again in September they’ve got somewhat of a head start. In the afternoons the program offers a wide variety of activities such as sports, dancing, guitar, rock and jazz band. Often times this is the only opportunity the children will get all year to be involved with the arts. On Fridays I would accompany a group of incoming 9th graders at Robert Grey Middle School, chaperoning them to different schools and work-sites around the Portland metro area. The purpose of these trips was to show the students that if they work hard in high school, their achievements could lead them to interesting career or college choices. My involvement with the kids was usually one-on-one. Too often I saw great potential at their young age being squandered by either inattentive parents or inadequate funding. For a student who is passionate about playing a musical instrument, but cannot afford the instrument itself or the lessons, three weeks in the summer is all they are given to explore their passions. The SUN Program offers education, fun and even feeds the students if they so wish. These kinds of programs are essential, especially to schools whose students struggle with the added socio-economic pressures that are often found in their neighborhoods. It has been an honor and a privilege to work with these young adults and selfless teachers.”

Thank you, Kristen and Spencer. We’re proud of your dedication and the way you have helped us reach out to ‘do good’ around Portland.

downtown compassion clinic

DOWNTOWN COMPASSION CLINIC 2010

Members of First United Methodist Church have a rich history of involvement in providing for the needs of the world's poorest people. On Saturday, September 18, 2010 at the Memorial Coliseum, First UMC along with hundreds of volunteers from a wide spectrum of downtown churches will convene to provide basic medical, dental, vision, chiropractic and social service assistance to Portland's uninsured and under-insured.

In 2005, two local ministers began to ask why churches couldn't meet those same needs in their own backyards. They'd seen diverse churches come together in far-flung places—but could they do the same at home? What would happen if churches acted as The Church in a neighborhood? Compassion Connects was born from those early conversation and more than twenty such events have been held since then. The Downtown Compassion Clinic is the first event of this kind in our own "backyard."

First United Methodist Church is a lead partner in this initiative, along with First Baptist Church, First Christian Church, The Pearl Church, My Father's House, Solid Rock, and many other downtown churches. We have an excellent opportunity to build bridges with others who follow a tradition of servanthood. FAITH AND PUBLIC LIFE SERIES


This adult class series will explore various public issues and themes through the lens of our faith life. Each session will meet in the Fireside Room from 9:15 to 10:15 AM.
