Albert Einstein once commented that "Imagination is more important than knowledge." English poet Percy Shelley says that, "The great instrument of moral good is imagination."

Henry Ward Beecher, abolitionist and social reformer, called imagination, "... the secret marrow of civilization ... the very eye of faith."

Professor and psychologist Ann Ulanov goes so far as to suggest, "There is no life of the spirit without the imagination."

So what do you think of your own imagination? Do you honor it along with all the knowledge you have gained? Do you look to it to help you make the world a more just, kind, loving and healing place? Do you trust your imagination to lead you into deeper relationship with God?

To imagine – to dream, and envision, to visualize and conceive – seems to me to be vital work for our church today. Whether we are finding new ways to connect to the life-changing work of the Goose Hollow Shelter (go to www.pdxhfs.org to volunteer); or finding new ways to connect with one another through Sunday School classes or small group ministries (see www.fumcpdx. org for details); or whether we are finding new ways to connect with the world in compassion and service; or whether we are finding new ways to connect with God in worship; or finding new ways to connect our past, present and future with funding for our Capital Campaign ... It all begins with our imagination.

What we can imagine we can create. What we imagine together will in part determine what we experience together. It is vital work for us to do in this time and place.

In just a few weeks we will enter into a great season of imagination. Some call it "graduation," the celebration of the finish line for certain academic endeavors. I prefer the term "commencement," reminding us all that endings are more rightly seen as beginnings. For all those who will don cap and gown and receive diplomas this spring, I say congratulations – and thank God for imagination!

The power of imagination not only helps us achieve the milestones of diplomas and degrees – it also helps us to take the next steps. Imagination helps us to "commence" rather than simply "graduate." Imagination will take us from endings to beginnings, over and over again, as individuals, and as a community. Imagine that!

## THE 2014 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PROGRAM SUMMARY



The objective of the 2014 Capital Campaign is to complete upgrades to our facilities that save energy, conserve our financial resources and achieve compliance with current building and environmental codes.

We are seeking to raise \$1.35M of pledged support by Labor Day of 2014 which will enable us to complete a series of priority projects before the end of 2015.



The first component of our work is to redesign and reconfigure the restrooms near Collins Hall and the First Church Library. This project includes the installation of changing stations and redesigning the interior so that we increase accessibility for all by complying with the technical guidelines outlined in the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The second component of work will include some environmentally friendly interior and exterior work. We intend to lay new carpeting in the narthex and the nearby women's restroom so that we increase safety and refresh the look of this high traffic area.





An increasing safety concern also exists in our annex parking lot along 18th Avenue. We intend to protect the environment and reduce the accident risk posed to the public by cautiously resettling and repaving around the tree roots that are breaking through the pavement.

Our plan includes a list of recommended enhancements that enable us to increase safety, energy efficiency and usability of our Sanctuary. These enhancements include the installation of energy efficient and quakeresistant panes to replace our existing single-pane windows that overlook Beckham Court.






Our existing fixtures are no longer being manufactured and the installation of new LED lighting will derive the dual benefit of increasing our light level while helping us to more effectively manage our energy and maintenance costs.

The final component of our work will involve the installation of a new video projection system that will enable us to experience worship with the addition of visuals and sound.




